MESSAGE

The coming year presents significant challenges and opportunities as we look to improve the environment for the development of the arts, culture, sport and recreation.

A key challenge will be to raise awareness of the importance of the arts and sport to our overall quality of life. Too often, these areas are regarded as incidental to the development of our people and our society. Although we encourage our children to learn artistic and sporting skills at a young age, these efforts are too easily consigned



to the fringes of academic activity once they begin formal education. It is also difficult for those with the potential to achieve excellence in sport and the arts to combine the discipline of training and practice with the demands of the school curriculum. Once in the workforce, the pressures of our jobs make it difficult to devote time to artistic or sporting pursuits.

To enrich the lives of our citizens, we should provide more opportunities for them to enjoy the arts, culture, sport and recreation and to develop their potential and abilities to the full. This Bureau has therefore begun two extensive reviews of our cultural and sports policies to find ways of helping people of all ages to develop and pursue their interest in those areas.

In April 2000, we established the Culture and Heritage Commission to advise Government on policies and funding priorities in the development and promotion of culture and heritage. In March 2001, the Commission published a consultation paper to solicit views on our cultural development. It plans to submit its recommendations to the Chief Executive in 2002.

In April, we established the Sports Policy Review Team to begin work on a strategic blueprint for the further development of sport in the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region. The team has consulted extensively in the sports field, both in Hong Kong and overseas, and has conducted indepth research into issues related to sports development, with a view to proposing future policy directions. We will issue their report for public consultation towards the end of this year. I strongly encourage the public to examine and comment on its conclusions and recommendations.

Should we arrive at a clear public consensus on the directions for culture and sports, I hope to begin work early on drafting strategic policies for these areas, to serve as guiding principles for future development. It is our clear view that Government should not monopolise the running of the arts or sport. That is best left to people in the respective sectors. Rather, our wish is to develop policies that will allow for the better use of public resources in a coherent and effective manner, so that the arts, culture, sport and recreation can flourish and become an integral part of our lives.

Arts, Culture, Sport and Recreation

Policy Objective and Key Result Areas

ARTS, CULTURE, SPORT AND RECREATION

Our Policy Objective is to support and promote the development of the arts, culture, sport and recreation as well as preservation of our heritage throughout the community.

Overall Targets

This year, our targets in pursuing this Policy Objective are -

- to maintain an environment in which freedom of expression, diversity, artistic creativity and sporting excellence can flourish
- to make available resources for implementing policies and delivering services related to the arts, heritage preservation, culture, sport and recreation
- to make available a wide choice of arts, heritage, culture, sports and recreational facilities to the community
- to provide resources for the training of professional artists and elite athletes

Progress

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) aims to provide quality leisure and cultural services commensurate with Hong Kong's development as a world-class city and events capital. To achieve this, the LCSD has taken steps to develop a new culture of customer service amongst its staff through a series of customer service orientation programmes. It has also established Customer Liaison Groups at its major venues to obtain direct feedback from its customers on how the service can be improved and Work Improvement Teams to enhance the standard of service.

On the arts and culture side, we have continued to provide resources to the Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC) and the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts (HKAPA) to enable them to deliver services to promote and develop the arts. The Culture and Heritage Commission

(CHC) has identified eight areas (culture and arts education, library services, museum services, heritage preservation, planning of cultural facilities, deployment of resources, cultural exchange and West Kowloon Reclamation Development) as priorities for future deliberations. In March 2001, the CHC published a consultation paper to solicit public views on cultural development in Hong Kong.

In the field of sport and recreation, we have continued to provide resources to allow the Hong Kong Sports Development Board (HKSDB) to promote sport in accordance with its statutory mandate. Although the bid for the right to host the 2006 Asian Games was not successful, it provided us with a useful opportunity to focus closely on the importance of sport to our community and to promote sports culture in the territory.

We also achieved the following progress in our five Key Result Areas (KRAs).

1 Review areas where service may be improved

During the year, the LCSD carried out a number of reviews in its daily operations with a view to improving the service to the public. As a result of the Department's efforts, a number of improvements have been put in place, including the extension of opening hours for museums and study rooms in public libraries. In addition to the issue of new library cards, an integrated system has been adopted whereby new applicants can borrow library materials from public libraries in both the New Territories and urban areas. We will shortly conduct two consultancy studies to formulate a strategic plan for the long-term development of our public library services and for the provision of regional/district cultural and performance facilities in Hong Kong. The heritage preservation policy is under review and our intention is to strengthen the effectiveness in preserving and promoting our valuable historical buildings and archaeological sites.

As regards sport and recreation, we have made good progress in conducting reviews against plan. In June 2001, we completed a consultancy study on the requirements for major new sports and recreation venues. Since its establishment in April 2001, the Sports Policy Review Team has been laying the groundwork for the drafting of a strategic blueprint for sports development. We shall finish the first stage of this review towards the end of 2001. A review of the

booking procedures for recreation venues is in active progress and will be finalised for implementation by 2002. The review aims to realign and simplify the different booking procedures currently in use. We are also conducting a review of fees and charges with a view to achieving consistency with the overall sports policy.

2 Maintain sufficient resources to support the development of the arts, heritage, culture, sport and recreation

The LCSD has been allocated \$5,287.3 million to meet recurrent operating and related expenses for the year 2001-2002. In the area of arts and culture, we have allocated \$102.8 million to the HKADC and \$190.7 million to the HKAPA in support of their activities in 2001-2002. Disbursements totalling \$30.4 million have been approved in 2000-2001 under the Arts and Sport Development Fund (ASDF) in support of arts projects recommended by the HKADC.

In the area of sport, an annual grant of \$190.5 million has been allocated to the HKSDB for the current financial year. Disbursements totalling \$24.8 million have been approved in 2000-2001 under the ASDF to support individual initiatives in the HKSDB's strategic plan for sports development.

3 Enhance community involvement in the arts, heritage, culture, recreation and sport

Community advisers have been appointed to advise the LCSD on the delivery of services related to cultural programmes and venues. Regular meetings have been held with these advisers to gauge their views on new initiatives and policy reviews. We also work closely with District Councils on the promotion of recreation and sports, and cultural activities in the community.

In the area of cultural services, the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, the Hong Kong Dance Company and the Hong Kong Repertory Theatre were corporatised in April 2001. They are now managed by independent boards of directors comprising experts, professionals and community leaders.

In the area of sport and recreation, the LCSD has introduced a series of programmes to generate interest in sport and to promote community spirit. These include the "Healthy Exercise for All" campaign, the

School Sports Programme, Corporate Games, Young Athletes Training Scheme and age group competitions. The Department will also establish community sports clubs and district sports teams. We have secured resources to upgrade recreational camp facilities and to ensure compliance with safety standards.

4 Promote a wide choice of arts, heritage, culture, sports and recreational facilities

In the provision of cultural and leisure services, the LCSD aims to promote a wide range of cultural and sports facilities and activities to enrich the quality of life of the community at large. The Sam Ka Tsuen Leisure Centre and the Lai Chi Kok Park Stage III were opened to the public in September and November 2000 respectively. The Island East Sports Centre, the Tseung Kwan O Sports Centre and the Tseung Kwan O Swimming Pool were opened to the public in January, March and June 2001 respectively. We plan to open the Ouarry Bay Park Phase II (Stage I) and the Promenade and District Open Space at Siu Sai Wan by late 2001. A new sports centre in Luen Wo Hui, a local open space in Tuen Mun Area 44 and the Jordan Valley Playground, Phase II (Stage 2) will be completed and opened for public use in 2002. The Hong Kong Film Archive, the Hong Kong Heritage Museum, and the Sam Ka Tsuen Public Library were opened to the public in November and December 2000, and the Hong Kong Central Library and Tseung Kwan O Public Library in May and July 2001 respectively. The Tin Shui Wai Public Library will be opened for public use soon. The Antiquities and Monuments Office of the LCSD has carried out archaeological surveys as well as surveys of historical buildings and structures as scheduled. The third and final phase of Hong Kong's first urban heritage trail in Central and Western District was opened in December 2000.

In consultation with the 18 District Councils, we have formulated a Five-Year Plan of Capital Works Projects to meet community needs. We have finalised programme for the development of new sports and recreational facilities on four landfill sites in Kowloon and the New Territories.

5 Support excellence in the arts and sport

We have provided funding for the elite training programme at the Hong Kong Sports Institute, and have allocated a series of one-off grants from the ASDF for individual initiatives to raise the profile of sport and encourage local athletes. We have also provided resources to help our athletes prepare for major games. We will take part in the 9th National Games to be held in Guangzhou in November 2001 and the Asian Games in September 2002.

Some 287 graduates finished their studies at the HKAPA in 2000-2001. Most are now engaged in the performing arts and related technical fields.

Progress on each previously announced initiative under the above KRAs is set out in the "Detailed Progress" section of this report.

Looking Forward

To achieve our overall targets this year, we will undertake the following initiatives and targets under each of the KRAs for the coming year.

Review areas where service may be improved

While Hong Kong is well provided with a wide range of arts, cultural, sports and recreational facilities and programmes, there are still areas where particular pursuits are inadequately catered for or where supply has yet to match demand. On the basis of further research and review, we aim to develop strategies for achieving a reasonable balance between demand and service availability at all levels.

We will assess our performance in respect of this KRA against the following indicator –

 Percentage of reviews conducted on time and within budget. Our target is to complete all reviews within budget and with no more than a 15% variation in timing.

Arts, Heritage and Culture

We have continued to provide resources to the Hong Kong Arts Development Council and the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts. We will continue to monitor closely their funding needs and will provide them with resources to ensure that their functions can be carried out effectively.

Sufficient resources have been provided to the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) to support the development of the arts and culture as well as preservation of heritage. The Antiquities and Monuments Office of LCSD, under the guidance of the Antiquities Advisory Board, will direct its resources towards heritage education, preservation and conservation of antiquities and historical monuments as well as conducting archaeological surveys and excavations.

Sport and Recreation

In recent years, the amount of government funding allocated to sport in the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region has increased considerably. We intend to ensure a consistent supply of funding for the Hong Kong Sports Development Board's strategic initiatives, and to maintain the capability to respond to additional one-off requests for programme funding through flexible use of the Arts and Sport Development Fund.

As part of its overall efforts to assist the community to enjoy leisure pursuits, the LCSD provides financial assistance to National Sports Associations and local sports organisations through the Sports Subsidy Scheme.

We will assess our performance in respect of this KRA against the following indicator $-\$

• Percentage of spending of funds allocated to arts, cultural and sports development programmes. Our target is to spend 90% of the allocation for 2001-2002.

Enhance community involvement in the arts, heritage, culture, recreation and sport

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will continue to encourage and promote community involvement in the arts, heritage, culture, recreation and sport through providing both programmes and events venues to induce public participation at all levels. It has appointed panels of experts in various fields, namely community recreation and sport, horticulture and amenities, School Sports Programme, performing arts, museums and libraries, to advise the Department on the provision of leisure and cultural services. It has also worked closely with the District Councils.

Arts, Heritage and Culture

We will continue to provide funding and support to the Hong Kong Arts Development Council and major arts bodies to help promote community involvement in arts and cultural activities. The Antiquities and Monuments Office (AMO) of LCSD will continue to conduct promotional and educational programmes to heighten awareness of Hong Kong's heritage.

Sport and Recreation

In sport and recreation, we will continue to promote new initiatives and improve on current schemes to involve the wider community in more sports and recreational programmes and activities. In so doing, we will work closely with the District Councils and with the various National Sports Associations under the aegis of the Sports Federation and Olympic Committee of Hong Kong, China.

We will assess our performance in respect of this KRA against the following indicators $-\$

- The number of cultural presentations organised by LCSD. Our target is to organise 3 000 such presentations in 2002.
- The number of outdoor entertainment programmes organised by LCSD. Our target is to organise 700 such programmes in 2002.
- The number of exhibitions held in LCSD museums. Our target is to hold 65 exhibitions in 2002.

- The number of workshops/seminars/conferences held by AMO. Our target is to hold 27 workshops/seminars/conferences in 2002.
- The number of lectures conducted by AMO. Our target is to conduct 20 lectures in 2002.
- The number of heritage tours conducted by AMO. Our target is to conduct 70 such tours in 2002.
- The growth in the number of people participating in organised sports and recreational programmes. Our target is to achieve 6% growth in 2002.

Promote a wide choice of arts, heritage, culture, sports and recreational facilities

Arts, Heritage and Culture

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department will continue to provide a wide range of arts and cultural facilities and activities to cater for the needs of the community. We will work in co-operation with the Hong Kong Arts Development Council and other public bodies in Hong Kong to encourage the display of works of art.

We will continue to declare suitable buildings as monuments and to restore more historical buildings.

Sport and Recreation

Current practice is to aim to provide sports and recreational facilities for the community in accordance with the formulae set out in the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines. We will also take into account population growth, local demand and usage patterns in order to ensure that our venues meet the needs of the public.

Support excellence in the arts and sport

Arts and Culture

The Government recognises the importance of fostering and training professional artists. We support the operation of the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts (HKAPA) and provide the Academy with funding to enable it to provide professional training for students of performing arts.

Sport and Recreation

The Hong Kong Special Administrative Region's (HKSAR) elite programme for sports training, based at the Hong Kong Sports Institute, supports the local sports associations and their athletes through the provision of dedicated coaching and sports science and medicine services. We have continued our funding of this programme, and we will also earmark extra resources to prepare the HKSAR's sportsmen and women for specific major national and international events.

We will assess our performance in respect of this KRA against the following indicators $-\$

- The number of individuals supported by the Hong Kong Sports Development Board (HKSDB). Our target is for the HKSDB to support a minimum of 10 individual athletes on the elite training programme outside the Focus Sport scheme in 2002.
- The extent to which resources are made available for the pursuit of excellence in sport. Our target is for the HKSDB to make available a minimum of \$60 million in 2002 to the elite training programme.
- The number of HKAPA graduates. Our target is to have 350 graduates completing studies in 2001-2002.
- The number of HKAPA full-time students. Our target is to train 740 full-time students in 2001-2002.
